# OWN YOUR PEN

In an age of hyper information and algorithmic echo chambers, owning your pen is no longer about literacy but about authority, the refusal to let governments, media, history, or bias define your identity, your value, or your future. The moment you surrender that authority, you become a character in someone else's script, often miscast as the victim, the villain, or reduced to background noise in a story that was never meant to carry your truth, which is why the wisdom of Chinua Achebe remains urgent, that until the lions have their own historians, the history of the hunt will always glorify the hunter, a reminder that whoever holds the pen controls the narrative.

For Africa, this reality is not abstract, it is historical, as too many nations have been shaped by a single story defined through colonization, crisis, or dependency, yet transformation always begins the moment the narrative changes. Estonia rewrote its identity from Soviet control into a global digital leader, Rwanda rose from the Rwandan Genocide and chose unity over division, and even Dubai transformed itself from a desert trading post into a global symbol of ambition, innovation, and possibility, not because of resources alone but because it deliberately reauthored how it would be seen and what it would become. The pattern is undeniable, nations rise when they reclaim authorship, and Africa must do the same by rejecting inherited narratives and rising beyond imposed identities.

At an individual level, owning the pen is an act of courage, a decision to define truth in a world eager to label you. Malala Yousafzai refused to let fear write her story and instead used her voice to shape a global movement, while James Baldwin wrote with such clarity that he forced society to confront realities it preferred to ignore. This same truth is deeply personal, because being physically disabled and short in stature could have easily become the defining narrative of my life, yet I refused that script and chose to own my pain and transform it into purpose through the creation of Born Short Living Tall, a platform that challenges limitation and redefines possibility, and in the same way this magazine has endured seasons of uncertainty, resistance, and growth, yet it still stands because it refused to be described by others and chose to own its voice and direction.

Narratives are also shaped by institutions, and when the control of the pen shifts, so does the structure of truth itself. For decades knowledge and influence were held by a few, yet disruption occurs when new voices take ownership, just as Apple did not accept the narrative of being just another computer company but redefined itself as a global symbol of innovation, design, and cultural influence, proving that when you control your story, you do not just participate in the future, you shape it. The same shift is seen in platforms that democratize knowledge and in movements that challenge dominant histories, all reinforcing one truth that whoever holds the pen defines reality.

This is why owning your pen matters now more than ever, because in a world driven by artificial intelligence, deepfakes, and constant digital noise, stories are being written at unprecedented speed, and if you are not intentional, your identity will be shaped by systems that do not carry your full truth. To own your pen is to become the lion, to recognize that while you may not control everything that happens to you, you have absolute authority over what it means and what comes next, and this is the call of a generation not to inherit broken scripts but to write enduring legacies, not to echo outdated narratives but to author new futures with clarity, conviction, and purpose, because the story will be written either way and the only question that remains is who is holding the pen.

# BECOMING

WRITE A FUTURE YOUR PAST COULD NEVER PREDICT.

To write a future your past could never predict, especially within the vibrant, high potential landscape of modern Africa, requires more than motivation or positive thinking. It demands a deep spiritual and mental realignment, a conscious decision to reject inherited limitations and embrace a higher identity. This is where the mandate to Own Your Pen becomes both a mindset and a model, not just for inspiration, but for transformation. At its core, owning your pen means stepping into authorship, refusing to be defined by history, environment, or statistics, and choosing instead to define your life through vision, faith, and disciplined action. It is the understanding that your past may explain your starting point, but it has no authority over your ending. Africa's future will not be discovered, it will be written by those bold enough to own the pen.

## 1. RENEW YOUR MIND TO MATCH YOUR FUTURE

The first shift begins with what can be described as the principle of the new wineskin. In Luke 5:38, we are reminded that new wine must be poured into new wineskins, a powerful truth that speaks directly to mindset. You cannot carry a global, expansive future with a limited, survival based mentality. Many young people are trying to build extraordinary lives while still thinking in ordinary constraints shaped by past disappointments, cultural ceilings, or systemic barriers. To own your pen, you must first upgrade your internal capacity. This is not just self improvement, it is transformation. It is choosing to see yourself not as a product of your past, but as a vessel for your future. Until your mind expands, your life will remain confined to old patterns. If you lose control of your mind, you lose control of your story.

## 2. SPEAK THE FUTURE BEFORE YOU SEE IT

The second dimension of owning your pen is the power of declaration. In Romans 4:17, we see a model of creation that calls things that are not as though they are. This is not denial of reality, but the assertion of a higher one. Many young people are conditioned to describe their current struggles, repeating narratives of lack, limitation, and frustration, but ownership requires a shift from description to declaration. If you are to write a future your past could never predict, you must begin to speak that future now. The language you use must reflect where you are going, not just where you are. Vision is not only seen, it is spoken. When you consistently declare a higher identity, your mind aligns, your actions adjust, and your environment begins to respond.

## 3. REINTERPRET YOUR PAST AS PREPARATION

The third model is found in the life of Joseph, one of the most powerful examples of narrative transformation. His story, marked by betrayal, slavery, and imprisonment, should have ended in obscurity, yet in Genesis 50:20, he reveals a higher perspective when he says what was meant for harm was turned for good. This is the essence of owning your pen, the ability to reinterpret your past. Your pain is not proof of limitation, it is preparation for purpose. For many African youths, the challenges within their communities are not barriers but assignments. When you shift from seeing yourself as a victim of circumstance to a strategist of destiny, you take the pen away from your past and begin to write with intention. The very experiences that seemed to disqualify you become the foundation of your authority. This truth is deeply personal. I was never meant to be limited by my stature or physical disability, and I refused to accept that narrative. I chose to own my pain, and in doing so, I found my power. From that place, purpose was born, and limitation lost its voice.



#### **4. SOW BEYOND WHAT IS SAFE**

However, vision and mindset alone are not enough. The fourth dimension is disciplined action, captured in Ecclesiastes 11:6, which encourages consistent sowing without certainty of which effort will succeed. A future that defies prediction is not accidental, it is cultivated. If you only invest where it feels safe, you will produce predictable outcomes, but if you commit to learning, building, serving, and creating beyond your comfort zone, you begin to generate uncommon results. For the youth, this means developing skills relentlessly, pursuing knowledge intentionally, and engaging opportunities boldly, even when the environment seems uncertain. Excellence becomes your seed, and consistency becomes your strategy.

**What emerges from these principles is a powerful framework that moves beyond theory into practice. Owning your pen means renewing your mind until it can carry your future, speaking your vision until it becomes your reality, reframing your past until it becomes your advantage, and working your potential until it produces undeniable results. The ultimate picture of this transformation is resurrection, the understanding that what appears to be an ending can become a beginning. For many young people, their past represents a Friday moment marked by struggle, limitation, or loss, but owning your pen means living with a Sunday consciousness, the belief that something greater can rise from what seemed finished. It is the confidence that your story is not over and that you have the authority to continue writing it. The promise of Jeremiah 29:11 reinforces this truth, that there is a plan filled with hope and a future not defined by harm but by purpose. If that is true, then the responsibility shifts back to you. Why allow your past to hold the eraser when your future is waiting to be written? This is the model. This is the solution. 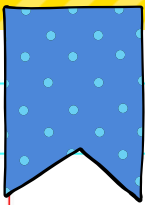
*Please forgive my past, guide me in the present, and secure my future. Fill me with Your Holy Spirit, and help me follow Your will for my life.*

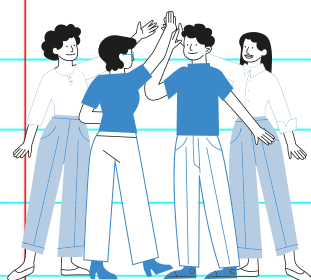

# YOUR MIND IS THE FIRST CHAPTER, STRENGTHEN IT.

Before anything is built in the physical world, it is first constructed in the mind. Every system, every innovation, every transformation begins as a thought that is developed, refined, and strengthened over time. Yet for many young people, the mind is often neglected, left vulnerable to noise, distraction, and inherited limitation. The result is not a lack of potential, but a lack of internal structure strong enough to sustain it. The mind is not merely a place where ideas pass through. 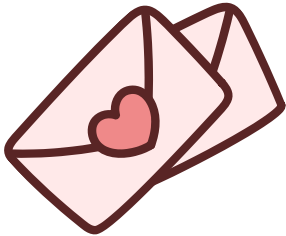
