CHERISE MAKUBALE: FROM REALITY TV STAR TO A LIFE OF IMPACT.

History remembers champions, but it reserves a special place for those who turn success into service. More than two decades after becoming the first winner of Big Brother Africa, Cherise Makubale continues to inspire not because of the spotlight she once occupied, but because of the quiet, enduring impact she continues to make. In September 2003, millions of viewers watched history unfold as a young woman from Kitwe, Zambia, won the inaugural season of Big Brother Africa. At just 24, Cherise walked away with the US\$100,000 grand prize, winning hearts through her humility, authenticity, and compassion. For many, such success would have marked the beginning of a celebrity lifestyle. Cherise chose a different path. Rather than allowing fame to define her, she turned it into a platform for service. Her story reminds us that while fame may introduce us to the world, purpose gives life lasting significance.

A NATION CELEBRATES ITS DAUGHTER

Before becoming a continental icon, Cherise was a procurement officer living an ordinary life on Zambia's Copperbelt. Inside the Big Brother house, she stood out not through controversy, but through kindness and authenticity. After 106 days of competition, she became the first-ever Big Brother Africa winner and the first Black contestant to win a Big Brother franchise anywhere in the world. Zambia celebrated her return with immense pride. Her victory became a symbol of hope for young people across the country. Yet history would remember her for something even greater than her victory.



BEYOND FAME, TOWARD PURPOSE

Success is more than an achievement; it is a responsibility. While many pursue influence for personal gain, Cherise understood that influence is meant to serve others. Through the Cherise Makubale Foundation, she has supported vulnerable children, widows, orphanages, disability centres, schools, and underserved communities. Her humanitarian work has never been driven by publicity, but by genuine compassion. For Cherise, community service goes beyond charitable giving. It is about how people care for one another, strengthen their communities, and respect the environments they share. Even after relocating to the United Kingdom, she has remained connected to Zambia, particularly the Copperbelt, demonstrating that influence finds its highest purpose in service.

Behind every meaningful life are values that shape its direction. One lesson from her mother became the foundation of Cherise's mission: "Whilst we may not help everyone, everyone can help someone." Nkandu Beltz's journey is one of those stories that makes you pause and ask: What advice would I give my younger self?

1. Start Before You Feel Ready

You will never have all the answers. Nkandu did not wait for perfect conditions. She started selling fat cakes, ice blocks, and sugar as a young girl. Those small beginnings developed the mindset that later built businesses and transformed industries.

Advice to My Younger Self: Do not wait for confidence. Start, and confidence will follow.

2. Failure Is a Teacher, Not a Verdict

One failure cost Nkandu more than \$250,000, but it did not cost her her future. The greatest mistake is not failing. It is allowing failure to convince you that your story is over.

Advice to My Younger Self: Take the lesson. Leave the regret.

3. Choose Purpose Over Comfort

Leaving journalism for the mining industry was not the easiest decision. It was the right one.

Comfort preserves who you are. Purpose transforms who you can become.

Advice to My Younger Self: Do not chase the easiest path. Chase the one that matters.

4. Build People While You Build Success

Nkandu's vision was never simply to build a mining company. It was to create jobs, restore dignity, and transform communities.

The greatest leaders measure success by the number of lives they elevate.

Advice to My Younger Self: Never build a career so big that there is no room left for compassion.

5. Never Stop Becoming

Every season shaped Nkandu into a stronger leader. Every setback refined her character.

Every challenge expanded her vision.

Success was never the destination. Growth was.

Advice to My Younger Self: Keep growing. The person you become is more valuable than anything you achieve.

If I could speak to my younger self, I would say this:

Dream boldly.

Fail courageously.
